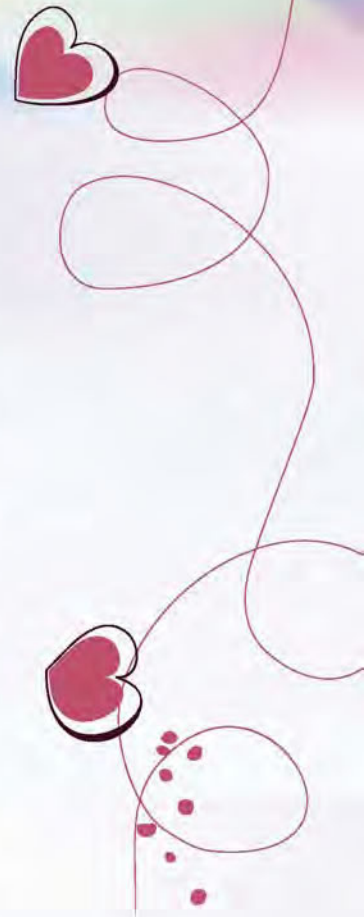

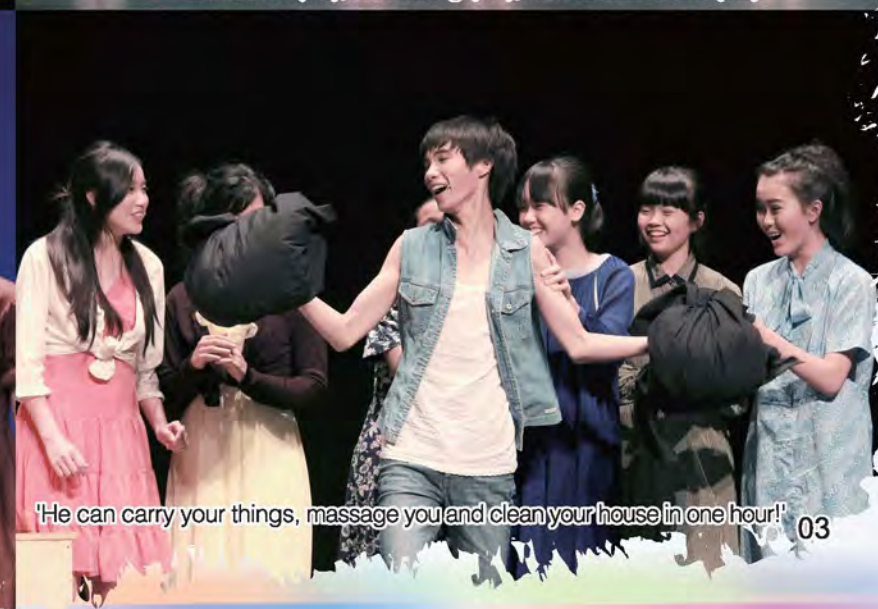

Wincy Chan, Sammi Li and Ivan Luk from the Hong Kong Management Association K S Lo College participated in the 'Travel, Experience, Share' programme organised by the Wai Yin Association. They planned a fourteen-day trip to Germany and visited Frankfurt, Hamburg, Freiburg and Munich, in order to investigate how Germans live their green lifestyle.

How Germany Goes Green

When we were selected as participants in the 'Travel, Experience, Share' programme, we felt both exhilarated and anxious. We were granted a precious chance to broaden our horizons outside Hong Kong, but at the same time, had to plan from scratch a trip to a country we knew very little about. During the first pre-trip meeting, it was very hard to reach a consensus about the main theme of the trip as we are studying different subjects and hence have different interests. Seeing that our discussion was leading nowhere, Mr Kum, our teacher advisor, suggested that we pick something that is relevant to our daily lives. That was how we came up with a topic that we thought everyone could relate to - How Germany Goes Green.

In the beginning, we believed that our role was just to assist our teacher, who would plan the entire trip to Germany for us. We were totally wrong! 'I won't help you unless it's necessary because this is YOUR trip!' said Mr Kum. As we were all inexperienced travellers, we were completely lost at the beginning. Eventually, we decided that the best way to start would be to do some research into where we should go. We also contacted organisations in different cities to arrange visits or guided tours. We felt really grateful when we received an information pack from the Hamburg Tourist Board after we emailed them asking for information about the green efforts in the city. When we finally

finished planning the fourteen-day itinerary by ourselves, our sense of achievement was enormous.

What impressed us most during the trip was how committed Germans are to their green lifestyle. Bicycles are favoured by many Germans for their zero-emission travel, and bike paths lead to nearly every corner of their big cities. Waste separation is routine in Germany too. Apart from plastic and waste paper, organic waste is also separated for the generation of electricity. Recycling bins are a common sight in the streets. In Vauban, a district in the city of Freiburg, many households generate their own electricity using solar panels. Very often more energy is generated than consumed, and the surplus is then sold back into the city's grid for profit. To contribute to the greening of the city, residents gather regularly to maintain community parks nearby. Such a sustainable, green lifestyle is definitely effective in lessening our environmental impact, and has led us to contemplate the true meaning of 'going green'.

In stark contrast, public transport and shopping malls in Hong Kong are air-conditioned all year round. As some enjoy a cool indoor environment, others are suffering from the hot air vented from within when they walk on Hong Kong's streets. Recycling bins in the streets and buildings are simply decorations, while landfills in Hong Kong are reaching their limits. We hope to raise green awareness in the city by sharing with our family, friends and everyone what we saw in Germany, and hopefully one day we will see a greener Hong Kong too.



Wincy's Reflection



I found my first trip to Europe very meaningful and unforgettable. Germans are mostly very eco-friendly. They would choose to bear hot weather without using air-conditioners so as to protect the natural environment. Many families generate their own electricity using solar panels. They don't need very big rubbish bins, as they recycle proactively their plastic, organic, and paper waste so the

actual amount of waste produced is minimal.

Many Germans use the greenest mode of transport - their bicycles - every day, thanks to the bicycle trails which lead to nearly every part of the major cities we visited. Vast grasslands, rose gardens and greenhouses can be found in the heart of most cities. It is obvious that Germans are really proud of their green lifestyle!

Compared to Germany, Hong Kong's environmental measures are not so effective. Many of us often complain about the hot weather, yet never take action to help reduce global warming. After this trip to Germany, I will try to be a greener person and adopt a greener lifestyle every day!





Sammi's Reflection



During the fourteen days in Germany, we went to many places related to environmental protection, some of which were seldom visited by tourists. I felt really lucky to be part of this green tour! I've noticed a lot of differences between Hong Kong and Germany: for Germans, environmental protection always comes first.

In order to protect the environment, Germans are even willing to sacrifice their own comfort.

They would rather tolerate high temperatures instead of turning on air-conditioners. Would people in Hong Kong ever do the same? I can still recall the night we watched a ballet performance in the Thalia Theatre in Hamburg. Although it was a full house, there was still no air-conditioning!

In Germany, recycling bins for waste paper and plastic bottles are everywhere and people are used to recycling their waste. Even though we have the same bins in Hong Kong, they are only rarely used.

Many Hong Kong people hold a casual attitude towards environmental protection. They don't care about how much pollution they cause every day. In comparison, Hong Kong people have a lot of room for improvement when it comes to environmental protection!

Though this trip to Germany is over, lots of wonderful memories remain.

I still remember how curious and excited I was when I stepped out of the plane to Germany. I experienced the carefree lifestyle savouring coffee at a street side cafe. I also went hiking in the Black Forest. Breathing the pure and unpolluted air, I didn't even feel tired on the steep hiking trail. Those are some of the marvellous experiences that I will never forget.

Another impressive thing is how Germans take environmental protection seriously. Even though it was 30°C, they still looked very calm on buses and in restaurants with no air-conditioning. The ubiquitous bike lanes, recycling bins and green areas are evidence of how eco-friendly Germans are. Can Hong Kong people act the same way? This is a good question for us to ponder.

A Visit to Oxfam

Oxfam is an international charitable organisation which aims to help people living in poverty and uphold human rights. Class 3A participated in a series of activities about fair trade organised by Oxfam. The activities gave the students lots of insights about protecting the rights of poor people and helping farmers by buying fair-trade products. Three 3A students have written about their rewarding experiences at Oxfam.



Liu Ka Chu (3A)

On 3 December, we visited Oxfam in North Point. Oxfam is an organization which aims to help people living in poverty or suffering from diseases. Sometimes, Oxfam collects old clothes and sends them to needy people. They also help those in areas affected by natural disasters or war.

Visiting Oxfam was an enjoyable activity. That day, we attended a workshop on the topic of fair trade. We had a role-play activity in the workshop. It was entertaining. Everyone enjoyed it very much. We were divided into groups. My partners and I were told to act as collectors. We collected coffee beans from the farmers.

First of all, we started off designing our company and drawing our company structure on the blackboard. We had several departments in our company. For example, there was a department that helped separate the coffee beans and another department that helped repair the machines. Once our company was organized, we felt proud of ourselves because we could create this fantastic company.

Later, our whole class started discussing who should earn the most money. Some of our

classmates said farmers should get the most money. However, some said they felt it should be the suppliers. Then we had a heated argument. Everyone thought that they should get the most money because they thought they had done the most work. I felt excited during the argument.

Finally, the host speaker of the workshop told us some facts. Actually, suppliers get the most money. However, the farmers and the collectors earn the least amount of money. This fact was astonishing and I became upset. It is tremendously unfair to farmers because they are the most hard-working. Their income should not be so low.

After this meaningful trip, I have learnt we should buy food items that have fair-trade labels. If we buy fair-trade food, we can assist the farmers and collectors who are in need. Some charities such as Oxfam will improve their working environment. Although fair trade products are more expensive than normal products, buying them is beneficial to the farmers who live in poverty. Also, I will encourage my friends to buy fair trade products so that more people can help needy people. I hope I can go to Oxfam again. It was a rewarding trip!

Wo Lai Ki (3A)

On 3rd December, I went to North Point with my classmates to take part in a workshop. The workshop was organized by Oxfam. Oxfam is a charity which aims to help people living in poverty or facing diseases. This group works to help people regardless of their race or religion and has an international presence. Oxfam has offices and field stations around the world.

When we arrived, the speaker introduced herself and told us the topic we were going to explore: fair trade.

First of all, we played different roles to learn more about fair trade. We participated in a coffee trade role-playing activity. Before we could buy a box of coffee, we were told that there are different people involved: they are farmers, transporters, roasters and dealers.

My role was a farmer. First, I needed to separate the duties with my group mates. For example, we needed to plant coffee beans, pick coffee beans and remove the weeds. After distributing the work, we needed to think about what problem we could face and tell the other members of our group how we would solve it. For instance, we could face flooding, as it would lead to a decrease in crop yields. Therefore, we must build a drainage system to solve this problem.

Moreover, we discussed how much we should get when a box of coffee is sold \$20.5. I thought that we farmers should get \$6 but others thought farmers should only get \$2 to \$4. Therefore, we had an intense debate. I said farmers needed to use

more energy to work so we should get more money. Transporters said they also needed to use energy so they felt they should get more money. Roasters said they did a lot of work so they should get more money. Dealers said they needed to give salaries to their employees so they should get more money.

Last but not least, the speaker said we couldn't make a conclusion if we just discussed it so she showed us a video. On the video, we learned that farmers only earned about \$0.1 when a box of coffee was sold at \$20.5 and roasters could only earn \$0.2. After knowing that, all of us were surprised. We couldn't imagine that farmers and roasters could only earn just a little money. The speaker told us it was because their countries didn't carry out fair trade so they could only earn a little money. Also, she told us if a product was a fair trade product, there would be a label on its package. Therefore, we could help them if we purchased fair trade products.

After attending this workshop, I learnt that some workers in poor countries couldn't get their deserved salaries. Therefore, the government in their countries should carry out fair trade to help them. Also, we could buy fair trade products to help them.



Lam Ka Yan (3A)

On 3 December, a sunny Monday, my classmates and I went to North Point to visit Oxfam.

Oxfam is an organization which aims to help people living in poverty or facing diseases. It works on long-term projects such as collecting donated clothing and then sending the clothing to people in need. Some short-term projects include sending teams to repair roads damaged by natural disasters or wars. One of Oxfam's new policies is helping local people develop their own recovery strategies. Oxfam assists local people by educating them about new farming techniques which will help make greater yields and profits. It also helps these communities by building new schools or clinics so communities can learn lasting skills that will aid them even after the Oxfam teams have left.

Upon arrival, we went to the ninth floor of the building. A staff member took us to a large room and asked us to sit on the floor. Then, she started the talk. She used an interesting activity to teach us about fair trade. She separated us into four groups: farmers (Group 1), transporters (Group 2), processors (Group 3) and businessmen (Group 4). She said that there was a bottle of coffee which cost twenty dollars. She asked us to think about the roles

of the four groups and how much profit they should be able to share from the \$20. Every group had different opinions, for example, Group 1 thought that if they did not plant coffee, people would not have any coffee to drink so they should earn the most money and take a larger percentage of the \$20, and Group 2 believed that they only transported the coffee, so they should earn the least money.

However, the actual answer was totally different from what we expected. For a \$20 bottle of coffee, farmers only earn 1% of the money and transporters only earn 2%. Processors earn the most money. Businessmen take about 10% to 20% of the money. All of us were extremely surprised. After that, we went back to school.

After this visit, I now know that although farmers work very hard, they still cannot earn much money. Their devotion and sweat do not give them the return they deserve. It is very unfair to them. In my opinion, they are in pitiful situation. The government should set up laws to increase their income. Also, I will buy more fair trade products. All in all, I learned much from this meaningful trip, especially about the importance of fair trade. I hope I can go to other charitable organizations to learn more in the future.

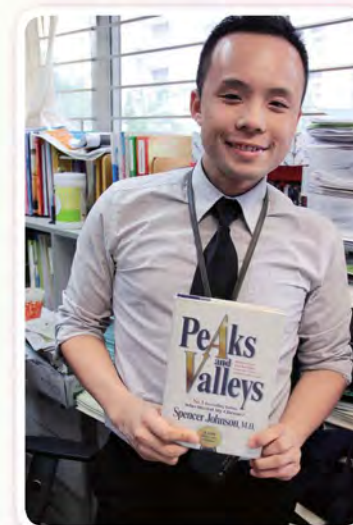

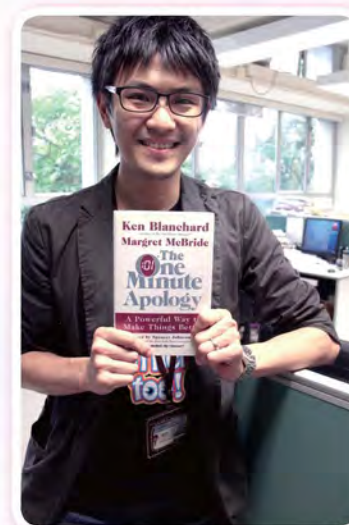

An Interview with Audrey Eu

Three student reporters for the K S Lo English Magazine met up with Ms Audrey Eu, a very well-known politician in Hong Kong. In the interview conducted in Ms Eu's office, Ms Eu told our reporters about her career, family as well as some political issues. Read on to find out more.

Chan Ka Man (2C)

I talked to Ms Audrey Eu about how she strikes a balance between her work and her family, and also about whether she thought she was a good mother. She said that she is a role model and is respected by her children. However, despite her efforts to be the best mom that she can be, she still experiences a

few family concerns. She said that the most difficult thing for her was to balance her family life and her work life. Since she is so busy, she usually isn't able to spend quality time with her children.

Busy parents have many things running through their minds. She told me that her way to cope with her career and family was



to jot down and deal with every request that her children had. She wanted her children to feel that they were loved and important. One time, one of her daughters asked her which dress she should wear to a special event. She knew that she had to give her good advice otherwise her daughter would feel bad.

Despite being a strong woman, there are always some issues that she has trouble dealing with. She said that even though her daughter is working in Central, she never goes out to lunch with her. The reason behind this was that her daughter feels embarrassed to be seen with her in public. She doesn't like reporters taking photos of her. Her daughter wants to maintain her privacy. These kinds of scenarios can affect family relationships. She feels really upset when her daughter refuses to see her because of this problem.

It was great to have a chance to interview Ms

Eu. It was an eye-opening experience, and I learnt a lot from it. I realised that although Ms Eu is a strong woman and politician, she still copes well with family demands.

I admire Ms Eu for her hard work very much. I respect how she works so hard and still tries her best to spend quality time with her children. Her path to becoming a member of LegCo was not easy. At the beginning of her career she faced many obstacles such as writing Chinese articles efficiently. But now, she has improved and fallen in love with what she does. She had to make a lot of progress to reach her goal of becoming a good legislator. Through the interview, I now have a better understanding of what 'no pain, no gain' means.



Lo Wing Lam (3B)

It was a pleasure to have had an interview with Ms Audrey Eu Yuet-mee (a former member of the Legislative Council of Hong Kong and the former (founding) leader of the Civic Party). In my opinion, Ms Eu is a very successful woman. She has a successful career and is the proud mother of a wonderful family. I really admire her, not only because she is successful, but also because of the way she treats others. There are also many other interesting things you should know about her.

Ms Eu is a very hard-working person. She has to handle many problems from different aspects of her life such as work related issues and family related issues. Although it is hard to balance work and family, she never gives up. She devotes her time and effort to ensure that she is able to meet both work and family commitments.

During the interview, she mentioned that it was difficult being a member of LegCo. She said it was hard because she had to write in Chinese, since she had lived in London for quite a while and was used to mainly speaking in English. As a member of LegCo, you have to speak and write in Chinese as well. She never gave up and worked hard to improve her Cantonese whilst at work. Her dedication to learning is definitely worth our praise! We all should follow Ms Eu's great example.

Ms Eu caught our attention when she used a very interesting idiom to answer one of our

questions during the interview. She told us that, "young people can change the world!" Hearing this from her encouraged me greatly. In the past, I didn't care about government or politics as I thought that my ideas wouldn't be taken seriously. After listening to Ms Eu, my opinion has changed. I now spend more time watching the news and caring about society. I will work and study harder to become a successful woman like Ms Audrey Eu.

I was very much impressed by how kind and enthusiastic Ms Eu was. Our interview with her went for about an hour. Many of my classmates felt tired towards the end, but she didn't. She remained vigorous throughout the interview. She always had a smile on her face and answered all our questions thoughtfully and patiently. When we asked her if she thought she was a 'good mother', she seemed a bit hesitant and tried to answer the question cautiously. She replied by saying, "I don't know", and added that we should ask her daughters.

After the interview, some of my classmates wanted to take some photos with her and she didn't refuse. She was very kind and gracious towards all of us.

I learnt a lot from Ms Eu. I will work harder from now on and hope to become a successful woman just like her in the future!



Lui Cheuk Ying (3B)

It was a great honour to interview Ms Eu. She is an incredibly successful woman who first started out as a lawyer. She is also a former member of the Legislative Council of Hong Kong, as well as the former (founding) leader of the Civic Party. Given that she has such a successful career, it means that she is very busy. Given that she is so busy, we all wondered whether or not she's able to strike a balance between work and family. That's why we asked her whether or not she thought she was a good mother.

Although she is a busy woman, she insisted that she always leaves time for her family, especially her three daughters. She always makes sure that when her daughters need her, she is there for them instead of telling them, "I am busy". One thing that Ms Eu was a bit sad about was the fact that she wasn't able to have lunch with one of her daughters. Her daughter doesn't like being in public with her because reporters take photos of them together.

It must be difficult for Ms Eu to become a good mother, especially when her children may not always understand her problems and difficulties. However, she does try to spend as much time as she can with them.

During the interview, we also talked about another political figure, Longhair. I personally believe that he is the soul of the LegCo.

Ms Eu said she respects him. She met him about 13 years ago. At that time, he failed to win a LegCo seat in the New Territories and decided to move to Hong Kong Island. She thinks he is a gentleman and said that he knows a lot about Chinese History. Ms Eu pointed out that whenever she needed help, Longhair would always help her.

A Visit to Crossroads

Crossroads Foundation is a Hong Kong based, non-profit organisation serving global needs. The term 'crossroads' is a place where two roads meet and cross each other. The foundation aims at providing a 'crossroads' to link those in need with those who can provide help.

Some Form 5 students visited the headquarters of Crossroads to find out more about issues like living with a disability, AIDS and fair trade.

The visit to Crossroads Foundation was a great experience. What impressed me most were the Story Time and Blind Experiences.

During the Story Time experience, I listened to the story of an eight-year-old boy who lives in Africa. The boy's village was attacked by an insurgent army and the soldiers forced him to make a difficult decision. They threatened to kill either his brother or sister and he could only save one of them. In the end, the boy chose to save his sister and then witnessed the soldiers kill his brother. Then the boy had to face something that was even more terrible than death: He was forced to become a soldier even though he was only eight years old. His sister was then molested by the soldiers. She was only seven years old. Luckily, they both escaped after the battle.

I found it a really hard decision to choose who to save. This boy will remember his brother's death for his whole life. His story makes me

think about how lucky I am. In my life, there is no need to face wars or any serious hardships similar to the ones faced by that African boy. Now I understand that somewhere in the world people are living unbearable lives and desperately need help.

Another impressive experience was being in a dark room. The dark room was a simulation of losing our eyesight. As a person who is currently able-bodied, I am always afraid of losing my eyesight. However, I was very surprised when I was in complete darkness. After losing my eyesight, I found that I could hear more clearly and feel my surroundings by listening and smelling. It was a great experience as it allowed me to empathise with the blind.

After this meaningful visit, I will be more concerned about the lives of needy people, and also more careful about protecting my eyes!

I visited Crossroads Foundation on Wednesday, 20th March. When I arrived, one of the volunteers introduced us to some information about the foundation and the activities of the day. I was really looking forward to the activities she had mentioned.

First, I started the 'AIDS x-perience' with my partner. Although the volunteer spoke to us in English, her instructions for us were very clear.
